

Find out more about each of these Henley places below.



1. A country house which saw fighting in the English Civil War, with later gardens by Capability Brown.

10. An eyot (river island) with an ornate temple or folly built by architect James Wyatt in 1771.

3. A Tudor country house and gardens, built in 1346, now run by the National Trust.

2. One of Henley's main shopping streets.

11. The church overlooks Henley Bridge and dates from the 13th century. It was remodelled in the 15th and 19th centuries.

4. A Victorian mansion in the Gothic style, built in 1889 and later owned by George Harrison of the Beatles.

12. A road bridge built in 1786 over the River Thames. It has five stone arches and stone heads of Tamesis and Isis.

3. Grey's Court

5. A traditional English pub, over 250 years old. Once used as the setting for Midsomer Murders.

13. Formed in 1830, the year after the first Oxford and Cambridge Boat Race was held in Henley. The Club is one of the top rowing clubs in the country.

7. The train station was built in 1857 for the large numbers of people travelling to Henley for the Regatta.

14. The island is only accessible by boat and is named after its narrow shape.

6. The Catherine Wheel pub was mentioned in a Henley will in 1499. Its large entrance allowed stagecoaches to pass through.

8. An area of natural beauty with a bandstand, named after the mill that once stood nearby.

9. A museum dedicated to the river, the sport of rowing and Henley itself. It was founded in 1998 and the building was designed by Sir David Chipperfield.

15. A country house and garden bought by Frederick, Prince of Wales, in 1738. It was once Britain's most expensive home.

16. Once a flash lock, then a pound lock from 1773. The lock and weir are still used today.
